

More and more families are not able to make ends meet and are coming to St. Christine's Community Services food bank for groceries. The food bank currently helps 195 families each week; a 35% increase since last fall. The need for food to feed these families is great. To help

stock the food bank, St. Cyril's will be sponsoring a non-perishable food drive at the Activity Center on Saturday, September 19, from 9:30AM to 11:30AM. The foods that are most needed are canned meats or tuna, cereal, salad dressings, and taco or pizza making kits but donations of any canned or packaged foods (no glass jars, please!) will be greatly appreciated. Please bring your donation in a sturdy cardboard box or a bag ready to be transported.

Because of current restrictions, this will be a drop-off food collection. What does that mean? It will be a lot like the drop off for Catechism. You will enter the Activity Center parking lot from 18 Mile Road and drive to the back of the building.

Mosaic Renderings on Display through September

Last October, Fr. Kamil Drab, CSSR, master mosaic artist known as the "Michelangelo of Slovakia", visited our church to share his deep knowledge of, and devotion to, the Mosaic artform and to determine how Mosaic artwork could enhance our worship space. Father Drab returned to Slovakia eager to create renderings for our consideration to include this form of sacred artwork in our church.

Recently, we received Fr. Drab's proposals and they will be on display in the Fr. Mikus (North) Hall through September. As Father Drab discussed when he visited us, there is much symbolism in the design of our church, as there is in all churches. He expressed that the original architect of Ss. Cyril & Methodius designed three hexagon-shaped skylights: one in the vestibule, one above the baptismal font and one above the altar. It was designed like this to represent the way of Christian initiation: one begins in the vestibule outside the sanctuary, then travels to the baptismal font where one becomes a member of the Catholic Church and then to the altar where on receives Christ in the Eucharist. There are ledges that form a line connecting the skylights. Father Drab is recommending that these "lines" be adorned by touches of gold artwork.

The Mosaic artwork would begin in the entryway of the church, above the baptismal font. Representations of the Old Testament would adorn the upper left walls that lead to the sanctuary, while the New Testament would adorn the upper right walls that lead to the sanctuary. The two triangular walls that are positioned on the outside of the crucifix would feature our patrons, Ss. Cyril & Methodius, as well as the two original Ss. Cyril & Methodius churches.

The Old Testament representations on the left-hand side of the church would begin with the Story of Creation, Adam & Eve, Noah, Abraham, Joseph (coat of many colors), Moses and the Red Sea/Ten Commandments). The New Testament representations on the right-hand side of the church would begin with the Annunciation, followed by the: Birth of Jesus, Baptism in the Jordan, Wedding Feast at Cana, Parable of the Sower, Prodigal Son, Healing the Blind Man, Our Lady of Sorrows, Last Supper, Resurrection and Pentecost.

Our beautiful Crucifix would remain as-is, with the back marble wall enhanced with gold-leaf detailing to tie all the beautiful Mosaic artwork together.

St. Cyril - School Beginnings • Church History Continued

In 1918, the first church that was build on the corner of Heintz & Foster Streets near Mt. Elliott and Harper on the east side of Detroit began with great hope. It was a plain brick building and poorly furnished. When Father Joseph Zalibera arrived at the church, he was faced with this small building and less than 100 parish families. He was appointed as pastor of Ss. Cyril & Methodius on March 22, 1922, and began his work with tremendous energy as he foresaw the gigantic tasks that lay ahead. Father's dynamic personality and enthusiasm attracted many new people to join the church. Because of the rapid growth in the number of parishioners, the need to build a larger church became apparent, so a year later on April 19, 1923, property was purchased on Centerline and Marcus Avenues for \$34,500 (2020 value = \$522,748). An old farm house located on the new property site was remodeled by the men of the parish and served as the parish rectory.

(Continued from Page 6) Also, as new pastor of the church on Heintz Street, Father Zalibera recognized the need to start a grade school, because many of the children, whose parents recently arrived from Europe, spoke only Slovak. At that time no Slovak-speaking community of nuns existed in the Detroit area. The necessity for a school was becoming more apparent, but Father also needed to find a community of sisters who would understand his people and dedicate themselves to this important task.

A small group of sisters who came from Slovakia in 1913 lived in Windber, Pennsylvania and taught school in that area. In July, 1923, the pastor of Ss. Cyril & Methodius in Windber asked the sisters to pay rent during the summer months. Because they had no money and no way to earn it, the decision was made to beg for money. Two Dominican sisters from Pennsylvania, Sister Mary Salesia (De Sales) Zavodnik and Sister Mary Joseph Gazda set out to solicit financial assistance. A sister in their community had a relative in Detroit and they were told they would be welcome to stay here, so they decided to come to the city. Shortly after their arrival in Detroit, having no knowledge of the area, the two sisters began to beg, somehow finding their way to Hastings Street, a section of Detroit that was historically an isolated and segregated African American community. Later that day they returned to their lodging place with contributions of \$80.00, a considerable amount of money in 1923 (2020 value = \$1,212). Their next effort was to approach the Czech church, where they hoped to find support. The pastor, Father Janecek, said he could not help them, but directed them to the Slovak parish. The next day the two sisters walked for three hours trying to locate Ss. Cyril & Methodius Slovak Church and its pastor, Father Joseph Zalibera. When they arrived, they greeted him in Slovak and were graciously received by Father, who was surprised and delighted to learn that a community of Slovak sisters existed, saying, "I did not know there were such Slovak speaking sisters."

He immediately shared his plan to them for starting a school that fall. Father's proposal was to have the two sisters teach the first four grades, and the church would be used as a temporary school. Abandoning their begging efforts, the two sisters returned to Windber to prepare for this new assignment. When they returned from Pennsylvania on August 15, they were stunned to find that instead of four grades, eight grades of children had been enrolled. Their grueling experience of founding a school began with no school building, no teachers, no money and little food.

On September 8, 1923 the temporary school was opened. The church building served as a school for eight grades during the day, citizenship classes in the evenings and Masses on Sundays. The classrooms would be instant makeovers. No sooner would morning Mass be over than somebody would draw the large canvas curtains which served as partitions. Suspended from galvanized pipes, these curtains formed four long, narrow classrooms. There were two grades per room and one small, portable blackboard. The pupils would be sitting in the church pews, and right after the Mass ended they would all lift up their "desks"-long narrow boards with a groove at the top for pencils. These were attached to the front of each pew with hinges to hold up and pull down as needed. Two rows of pews were removed from the middle of the church to make a passage between the four rooms. A huge canvas curtain separated the sanctuary from the classrooms. It was drawn right after Mass and the Blessed Sacrament was taken to the sacristy. The two sisters and two lay teachers were entrusted with the giant task of teaching 260 children. Two small toilet rooms in the basement were shared by the children and adults. Teaching was difficult due to the chatter from other classes, and the windows were hard to open, so little fresh air came into the rooms.

Because enrollment continued to increase, more sisters were added to the staff the following year. Classes were once again conducted in the partitioned church, but the assurance by Father Zalibera that there would be a new school made the teaching hardships easier to endure. Living conditions were not easy for the sisters. Their home was the old rectory on Heintz Street and was described as living in a "pill box". In 1924, Reverend Victor Klimko became the first Assistant Pastor and undertook the duties of teaching religion and preparing the students for their First Holy Communion.

On April 19, 1925 ground was broken for the erection of a new combination terracotta building consisting of church, school and auditorium. At a parish meeting, it was decided that each family donate a given sum of money in order to finance the church/school building project. The parishioners responded by doubling, and in some instances, tripling their contributions. Confident in the generosity and reliability of the Slovak people, Bishop Michael Gallagher blessed the cornerstone on November 29, 1925. On May 9, 1926 the auditorium was opened and was the first completed unit of the new parish building.

At the beginning of October, 1926 it was announced to the sisters that part of the new school complex was completed, making it possible for them to get settled into their convent and get classrooms organized. The sisters moved into their new quarters on the second floor of the school building. The "convent" consisted of five (proposed) classrooms, converted into dormitory style rooms with seven sisters sharing one classroom. The first Mass in the new auditorium was held on November 1, 1926 in what later served as the school cafeteria. The following day, with an enrollment of well over 300 students, eight elementary school classrooms were opened.

As the community of sisters continued to grow, Sister DeSales asked Bishop Michael Gallagher for permission to establish the Motherhouse of the Dominican Sisters in the United States. Permission was granted and Father Zalibera was appointed as an Advisor and Spiritual Director. He took this position given to him very conscientiously. Father then proceeded to acquire property on Van Dyke and 13 Mile Road in Warren, Michigan to build a Motherhouse for the Slovak Dominican Sisters. Through Father's skilled negotiations he succeeded in obtaining this land as a donation to the sisters. Groundbreaking for the first Motherhouse was held in May, 1927.

Construction continued on the massive complex and the first Mass in the Church proper was held on Christmas Eve, 1929. Unfortunately, the Great Depression halted further progress and brought all expansion of the building to an abrupt standstill for several years.
