

Virtual Retreat: Spirituality of the Evangelist Retreat: January 23 / Registration Deadline: January 18

All are welcome for a Catholic Biblical School of Michigan (CBSM)-sponsored virtual retreat on Saturday, January 23, from 9:00AM – 3:00PM, held on Zoom.

TOPIC: The Spirituality of the Evangelist

The Virtual Retreat features talks by Adam Janke of St. Paul Street Evangelization, times of quiet away from the computer for reflections, opportunities for group discussion, and guided prayer.

Retreat Overview

Talk #1: What is MY story? We begin the day in reflection of our background in terms of relationship with the Lord (e.g., prayer, sacraments, joys, difficulties).

Talk #2: Each of us has encountered obstacles toward being an 'evangelist.' For some, it's fear of not knowing enough or fear of what others will think of us. Others shrink back from evangelization out of a false sense of inadequacy. We need the Holy Spirit to heal us from those obstacles and anxieties that keep us from growing in holiness and becoming all God has created us to be.

Talk #3: Come, Holy Spirit! In this final talk, we learn about the role of the Holy Spirit as the converter of hearts. How can we grow in a relationship with the Holy Spirit and become docile to where and how we are being led to reach out to others?

Family and friends: Although 2020 has given us many challenges, we are very thankful for our faith in Jesus and the community that is His Body, the Church. Since some of you may not be familiar with the St. Monica Sodality, this article will briefly explain the ministry and the saints associated with it.

The St. Monica Sodality prays for loved ones to return to the full practice of the Catholic Faith and for conversions. We gather on the fourth weekend of each month for Holy Mass. The January and February Masses take place on Sundays at 9:30AM, but the Mass schedule will rotate going forward so please see the bulletin for future Mass information and join us whenever you can. Your prayer petition slips are inserted into a covered album that is placed in front of the altar during the Mass. While we cannot officially gather after Mass for the regular prayers (The Divine Mercy Chaplet and The St. Monica Sodality Prayer), we encourage you to continue praying these for your loved ones. Please stop by the St. Monica petition box (between the double doors at the main entrance of the church) for prayer information and petition slips (you can return petitions anytime).

St. Monica was born in North Africa around 332AD, was raised Catholic, married a pagan and had three children - Augustine was the eldest. Her marriage was difficult - with an unfaithful husband and a mother-in-law who disliked her, however, she converted them through her virtuous life and her prayers. Augustine received a formal education but was caught up in worldly things. Very concerned, Monica prayed much and shed many tears for him. A bishop once told her that Augustine's heart was too stubborn, but God's time would come. The child of so many tears could not perish. After many years, her prayers were answered and Augustine was baptized. He became a priest, bishop and Doctor of the Church, and his extensive writings still exist today. St. Monica is sometimes pictured holding a jar of tears and a copy of St. Augustine's book - Confessions. Their feast days are celebrated on August 27th and August 28th.

We invite you to join us at the next St. Monica Sodality Holy Mass next Sunday, January 24, at 9:30AM.

PRO-LIFE UPDATE


With great disappointment, Right to Life–LIFESPAN decided to cancel the annual "Movement in Motion" Youth Bus Trip to Washington, DC that many of our young people and some of their parents were planning on attending. New developments had arisen over Thanksgiving that caused the organization to question the possibility and safety of the trip. Restrictions in MD, OH, WV, VA, and PA would hinder the group as far as reliable access to restaurants, restrooms, and even places to visit while in the DC area; the Catholic host church could no longer host our group overnight after the March for Life; access to the Basilica of the National Shrine in DC was being greatly limited; and, there is also real concern of civil unrest in the DC area due to the political struggle that is taking place in our country.

LIFESPAN is hopeful that we will have a joyous return to Washington, DC in January, 2022! All young people and their parents as well as young adults who are interested in the 2022 trip can notify me, *Lynn Gura*, Youth Director, at oakmac@rtl-lifespan.org. Plans will start to develop this spring and into the summer. I will keep you informed.

The annual March for Life in Washington, DC is still taking place on Friday, January 29. EWTN has the best coverage of the whole event. That's what we will be tuned in on. See page 7 for details on EWTN coverage.

A Motor City Caravan for Life, sponsored by LIFESPAN, is taking place on Saturday, January 30. The Caravan will start at St. Hugo of the Hills Parking Lot (near Square Lake & Woodward) at 12:30PM, travel round-trip on Woodward Avenue to Downtown Detroit and back to Long Lake Road. It will then head east to White Chapel Cemetery where participants will pass by a Wreath Laying Ceremony at the grave of five aborted babies. Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children • January 22

USCCB, respectlife.org/January 22 - The over 56 million abortions since the 1973 decisions of Roe v. Wade and Doe v. Bolton reflect with heartbreaking magnitude what Pope Francis means by a "throwaway culture." However, we have great trust in God's providence. We are reminded time and again in Scripture to seek the Lord's help, and as people of faith, we believe that our prayers are heard.

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal, no. 373, designates January 22 as a particular day of prayer and penance, called the "Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children": "In all the Dioceses of the United States of America, January 22

(or January 23, when January 22 falls on a Sunday) shall be observed as a particular day of prayer for the full restoration of the legal guarantee of the right to life and of penance for violations to the dignity of the human person committed through acts of abortion."

As individuals, we are called to observe this day through the penitential practices of prayer, fasting and/or giving alms. Another way to take part is through participating in special events to observe the anniversary of Roe v. Wade. Call your local diocese or parish to find out what events might be taking place in your area.

National Prayer Vigil for Life • January 28 & 29

USCCB.org, Pro-Life Activities - The National Prayer Vigil for Life is an all-night pro-life prayer vigil held on the eve of the March for Life each January. Over 20,000 pilgrims from across the nation pray through the night for an end to abortion and a greater respect for all human life. It is held at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C.

The vigil <u>schedule</u> includes the Opening Mass celebrated in the Great Upper Church. Prayer continues throughout the night with the National Rosary for Life, Night Prayer and Holy Hours for Life. The following morning, the prayer vigil concludes with Morning Prayer, Benediction and the Closing Mass the next morning.

The National Prayer Vigil for Life is one small part of the Church's "great prayer for life." It is sponsored by the USCCB Pro-Life Secretariat, the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, and The Catholic University of America Office of Campus Ministry.

A great prayer for life is urgently needed, a prayer which will rise up throughout the world. Through special initiatives and in daily prayer, may an impassioned plea rise to God, the Creator and lover of life, from every Christian community, from every group and association, from every family and from the heart of every believer. —Pope Saint John Paul II, Evangelium Vitae
