




Religious Education for Grades Kindergarten thru 8th Grade:

Due to limited room availability, only registered parishioners can enroll at this time. Students with **Special Needs** do not have to be registered parishioners. **Home School Program:** Only those who are home schooled for other academics may home school for religious education. * Home school students looking to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation in 2022 (8th Grade) and 2023 (7th Grade) must enroll at this time. The Confirmation Program is a two-year program. You must be enrolled both years to be eligible. Home school students looking to receive their First Holy Communion in 2022 (2nd Grade) must be enrolled at this time.

Registrations for Catechism should be submitted by July 1 as we are in the process of ordering books and securing teachers. If you need the forms, they are available on the parish website or contact Carroll Schuller in the Parish Office, (586) 726-6911.

A Catholic Father's Day: St Joseph and The Beatitudes

The Beatitudes are one surprising, often overlooked, source Catholic men can turn to for guidance in becoming the men, husbands, and fathers our families need us to be. Of course, God leads by example. As such, in addition to being a call to Christian discipleship, the Beatitudes also could be said to reveal something about the ways God the Father relates to us, His children. Seen in this light, the Beatitudes present a unique opportunity for Christian men to become holy fathers.

Blessed Are Dads Who Are Poor In Spirit

Seek to be a father after THE Father's own heart. Being a dad is on-the-job training. No one has it figured out. Don't pretend you do. Go to God every day. Ask Him to teach you to be the husband and father He wants you to be; the husband and father your wife and children need you to be.

Blessed Are The Dads Who Mourn

Be not afraid of feelings. Empathize with your family's tears, fears, and struggles. In scripture, "mourning" doesn't mean "be sad" so much as it means "cultivate a compassionate heart." It is not your job to fix or feel judged by your wife or kids' feelings. It is your job to be present to your wife and kids, to understand why they feel as they do, to show that you care, and to help them work through their feelings in godly ways

Blessed Are The Dads Who Are Meek

Meekness isn't weakness. Cultivate the humble strength of a listening heart. In biblical Greek, the word for "meek" is "prauss," it was adjective used to described a war horse that is not easily spooked in battle and responds readily to its rider's commands. A real leader listens first. The father who is authentically meek is not afraid to listen to God and to attend to the needs his wife and children bring to him especially when doing so requires him to grow, change, or learn new skills.

Blessed Are The Dads Who Hunger And Thirst For Righteousness

Awesome Dads are on a Mission from God. Live for Him. Lead your family to Him. Research shows that when dads model discipleship in their lives and relationship and take the lead in prayer, faith formation, and character training in the home, kids are exponentially more likely to live your faith and values as adults. Be the father that leads your family to THE Father.

Blessed Are The Dads Who Are Merciful

Be a loving mentor in your home. Don't break hearts. Mold them. Don't be "The Punisher." Be a mentor and teacher. Treat your children with respect. Don't just yell or impose harsh consequences when they mess up. Instead, teach them how to meet their needs and express themselves in good and godly ways. Put more energy into encouraging, teaching and supporting good behavior than in punishing bad.

Blessed Are the Dads Who Are Pure in Heart

Cherish the treasure of your wife and children. Protect their dignity. Affirm their worth. Pope St. John Paul the Great taught that the opposite of love is 'use'. Love makes people more people-y. 'Use' makes people into things or tools. Don't treat your wife or kids as the "things" that exist to make YOUR life easier. Set the standard for loving service in your home.

Blessed Are the Dads Who Are Peacemakers

Keep your house in order. Prioritize your family. Protect the heart of your home. St. Augustine said, "Peace is the tranquility of right order." Be the handson dad that makes sure your household is characterized by respect, generosity, mutual service, and orderliness.

Blessed Are the Dads Who Are Persecuted for the Sake of Righteousness The world will try to undermine your effort to be an awesome dad. Be one anyway. When your friends, family-of-origin, co-workers, or employers try to make you sacrifice what's best for your family for what they want, choose your family and know God the Father will honor your sacrifice.

It is my prayer that every Catholic man would let the example of our patron, St. Joseph, teach us to be fathers after **THE FATHER'S** own heart!



Our History • Pastor Rev. Elemir Jozef Mikus (1977 - 1999)

Father Elemir Jozef Mikus was born July 26, 1927 in the town of Oreske in western Slovakia. He was the fourth of nine children born to parents Imrich and Rozalia Mikus. He attended the seminary in Trnava, where he graduated from the Salesian Institute of Don Bosco. He entered the Salesian order at Sastin and continued his studies in Slovakia. Due to the suppression of all religious monasteries and convents by the communists, he fled Slovakia and immigrated to Austria in March, 1950. He ended up in Rome where he completed his priestly studies. He was ordained to the Salesian order of St. John Bosco in Turin, Italy on July 1, 1957 by Cardinal Eugene Tisserant, then Dean of the College of Cardinals. He served as an Assistant Pastor at a parish in Saarbrucken, Germany from 1957 to 1963. In 1963 he was called to Rome and was among the first teachers at the Pontifical Slovak Institute of Ss. Cyril and Methodius in Rome.

Political and social reforms were taking place in Czechoslovakia that gave the Slovak people a small glimmer of hope for freedom, but on August 21, 1968 Soviet tanks rolled into the country quickly silencing the pro-democracy uprising. For thousands of Slovaks this was the impetus to start a new life in a new country. During this time Father Mikus was asked to work with immigrants as part of the Catholic Relief Organization (Caritas) program under the guidance of Cardinal Koenig. People escaped from the country by various ingenious methods risking imprisonment and even death. Many found their way to Vienna, Austria, and in most cases their only possessions were the clothes on their backs. They sought help at the local Caritas and it was there that they met Father Mikus. Father Mikus' ability to speak

and read six languages fluently was an invaluable tool in his dedicated assistance with both the refugees and civil authorities. The needs of the refugees were many including, food, shelter, medical aid, jobs and help with emigration. They could count on the assistance of Father Mikus and he was always available day and night. His reputation spread and the need for helping refugees continued. Father was an important link for many on the road to freedom. From 1968 to 1971, it is estimated that hundreds of Slovak refugees benefited directly or indirectly from his labors during his three year mission in Vienna.

On February 28, 1971, Father arrived in the United States to take up his new mission as an Assistant Pastor to serve the Slovak refugees fleeing their homeland as well as the American Slovak community at Ss. Cyril & Methodius Slovak Church in Detroit. In 1977 he was appointed Pastor of Ss. Cyril & Methodius, replacing Father Nosal.

Serving the mainly immigrant parish in the 1970's and 1980's Father Mikus often experienced hardships and struggles. The area became increasingly crime-ridden and dangerous. There was vandalism, burglaries in the church and the rectory, car thefts and Father being robbed at gunpoint twice. As early as 1981, it was becoming apparent that it would no longer be sustainable to maintain the Slovak church in Detroit. The closing of the parish school in 1971, the migration of most of the parish families to the suburbs, the declining neighborhood and fear of crime made the move necessary. The pastoral care for the Slovak immigrants who fled communism and for the ones who were still escaping necessitated a Slovak parish to serve their needs. Father Mikus along with several parish leaders met with Cardinal Edmund Szoka and voiced their concerns. They were told the parish had three options: close, merge with another parish, or move to the suburbs. The decision was made to move and permission was granted. Property was acquired at 18 Mile Road and Ryan in 1982, but actual construction did not begin for several years until adequate funds were raised. On June 30, 1985 the groundbreaking ceremony was held, and in 1987 construction began on the new church. On July 17, 1988 the blessing and laying of the cornerstone took place with Bishop Patrick Cooney presiding.

The last Mass at Ss. Cyril & Methodius Slovak Church in Detroit was held on December 18, 1988 with Bishop Patrick Cooney as the principal celebrant as well as former pastor Rev. Andrew Forish. There were tears and profound sadness as parishioners said goodbye to their 65 year old church. Father Mikus reassured the congregation that this should not be seen as the end but rather as a new beginning. On December 24, 1988, Christmas Eve, the first Mass was celebrated at the new Ss. Cyril & Methodius Church in Sterling Heights. Since the church was not yet complete, Mass was held in the Slavik Social Hall (now the cry, overflow and sacristy rooms).

A debt of gratitude and appreciation is owed to Father Mikus for his leadership and determination, as well as the generosity of the parishioners, that the historic Detroit Slovak parish was reestablished and that we have this beautiful church in Sterling Heights today. The culmination of Father Mikus' dream became a reality when the new Ss. Cyril and Methodius Church was blessed and dedicated by Cardinal Edmund Szoka on June 11, 1989.

As the new church began to flourish, it served not only Slovak immigrants but Americans of all backgrounds as well who joined the new parish. The new church became a labor of love for Father. Despite facing many difficulties, he always wore a smile. He was a hard worker and would often be found doing church maintenance himself, even mowing the grass. He took a keen interest in all projects at the church such as the installation of the pipe organ in 1996 and building of the grotto in 1998 on church grounds. Father celebrated his 40th anniversary of priesthood on July 27, 1997 with a Mass of Thanksgiving and a banquet attended by clergy, parishioners, family and friends.

On July 21, 1998 Father Benjamin Kosnac arrived from Slovakia to replace Father Mikus. Father Mikus attained senior priest status on January 29, 1999. He left his beloved St. Cyril parish and moved to Slovakia in March, 1999. In Slovakia he served as Pastor of Our Lady of the Rosary Church in Oreske, his native village. He died on August 6, 2013 at the age of 86.

Note: St. Cyril's Church in Detroit was sold to a Baptist congregation and they made use of the sanctuary until the late 1990's. By 2000 all of the parish buildings had been abandoned and were quickly "relieved" of their remaining contents. The demolition of the entire church/school complex took place in 2003 to make way for an industrial park.
