Tax Statement Request for 2025

If you made a single donation of \$250 or more in 2025, you will automatically be issued a tax statement per government requirements. Those that have used Pushpay or have given us an email address to enter into our database in the past will receive a tax statement automatically. If we have your email address before the third week in January, the email will come directly from a Pushpay email and not from the church email so please be aware of this when looking for the email. If your email address is received after the third week of January the email will likely come from a parish email.

If you are not sure if we have your current email address and would like to receive a tax statement via email you can go to our website, www.saintcyrils.church, to complete the tax statement request form there or contact the Parish Office to ensure your correct address is in our database. If you would like a paper tax statement for your 2025 tax deductible contributions, please complete the form on our website or fill out the form located in the vestibule and place it in the collection basket or drop it off in the Parish Office. Emailed tax statements should go out by January 22nd and paper statements will be available by the end of January.

HEART'S DEEPEST LONGING

Continuing in our look into how dangerous the ways of the world are, and how we must steer clear of them we read a reminder from St. John: "Do not love the world of the things in the world. If anyone loves the world, love for the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the eyes and the pride of life, is not of the Father but is of the world. And the world passes away, and the lust of it; but he who does the will of God abides forever"

(1 John 2:15-17).

If we indulge in the ways of the world, and are pulled into their seduction, misuse them, we will not enjoy them in the long run and it will lead to our ultimate unhappiness even if it may "feel" good, or right, at the time. By utilizing them, we willfully torture our own souls. We must have faith to believe that the happiness of man consists, not in having an abundance of the things of the world, but rather from within, if it keeps itself free from the world and seek calmness and satisfaction in Christ alone. Consider, if you will, our end. Once our lives are called from us what then remains? We certainly cannot take our worldly goods and delights with us when we have to give an account of our lives; they will avail us nothing. The question we must ask ourselves now is whether we're willing to endure and perhaps suffer for a time on earth in order to gain eternity life, or indulge now in the plenitude of worldly desires and suffer torment for eternity later.


We ask that teens have turned 14 years old before December 1 of last year and be at least freshmen to attend. You're welcome to come and bring a friend too!



Epiphania Domini



Homily of Pope Leo XIV

Dear brothers and sisters,

The Gospel (cf. Mt 2:1-12) described for us the great joy the Magi experienced when they saw the star once again (cf. v. 10), and at the same time how Herod and all in Jerusalem were troubled by their searching (cf. v. 3). Indeed, every time Sacred Scripture speaks of God manifesting himself, it does not hide the contrasting reactions, such as joy and agitation, resistance and obedience, fear and longing. Today we celebrate the Epiphany of the Lord, aware that in his presence nothing stays the same. This marks the beginning of hope, for God reveals himself and nothing remains unchanged. His presence puts an end to that type of melancholic complacency which causes people endlessly to say, "There is nothing new under the sun" (Eccles 1:9). Something new begins which determines the present and the future, as the Prophet announced: "Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you" (Is 60:1).

Homo Viator

The ancients referred to homo viator, and indeed all of our lives are a journey. The Gospel challenges the Church not to be afraid of this phenomenon, but to appreciate it, and orient it toward God who sustains us. He is a God who can unsettle us because he does not remain firmly in our hands like the idols of silver and gold; instead, he is alive and life-giving, like the Baby whom Mary cradled in her arms and whom the wise men adored. Holy places like cathedrals, basilicas and shrines, which have become Jubilee pilgrimage destinations, must diffuse the aroma of life, the unforgettable realization that another world has begun.

Reflection Questions

Let us ask ourselves: is there life in our Church?
Is there space for something new to be born?
Do we love and proclaim a God who sets us on a journey?

Epiphanies

How many epiphanies we have been given and how many more could be given to us! Yet they must lead us away from the intentions of a Herod, from fears that are always ready to be turned into aggression. "From the days of John the Baptist until now the kingdom of heaven has suffered violence, and the violent take it by force" (Mt 11:12). This mysterious expression of Jesus, reported in the Gospel of Matthew, cannot but make us think of the many conflicts by which men resist and even damage the new things that God has in store for everyone. Loving and seeking peace means protecting what is holy and, consequently, that which is newly born like a small, vulnerable, fragile baby. Around us, a distorted economy tries to profit from everything. We see how the marketplace can turn human yearnings of seeking, traveling and beginning again into a mere business. Let us ask ourselves: has the Jubilee taught us to flee from this type of efficiency that reduces everything to a product and human beings to consumers? After this year, will we be better able to recognize a pilgrim in the visitor, a seeker in the stranger, a neighbor in the foreigner, and fellow travelers in those who are different?

God's Reveals Himself to Man

Yes, the Lord still surprises us! He reveals himself and lets himself be found. His ways are not our ways, and the violent do not succeed in controlling them, nor can the powers of the world block them. This is the great joy of the Magi, who left palace and temple behind in setting out for Bethlehem; it is only at that moment that they see the star once again

Pilgrims of Hope

Thus, dear brothers and sisters, it is wonderful to become pilgrims of hope. It is wonderful for us to continue to be pilgrims together! The faithfulness of God continues to amaze us. If we do not reduce our churches to monuments, if our communities are homes, if we stand united and resist the flattery and seduction of those in power, then we will be the generation of a new dawn. Mary, Star of the Morning, will always walk before us! In her Son we will contemplate and serve an extraordinary humanity, transformed not by the delusions of the all-powerful, but by God who became flesh out of love.

MONTH 3

"I can suck my thumb now!"

Thank you for continuing to pray for your spiritually adopted baby!

Month 3 highlights include: Around week 9, the baby began to suck his thumb.

The baby also began to "sleep". Toenails are starting to form, and the baby has its own unique fingerprints.

The baby is breathing amniotic fluid to help develop and strengthen the respiratory system, but he gets the oxygen he needs throughout the umbilical cord.

By the end of the third month, the baby can squint, swallow, and move his tongue. Our babies are about 3-4 inches long and the size of a small lime.

You can follow your baby's growth and development each month by checking the "WATCH ME GROW" posters in the vestibule.

Our daily prayer by Archbishop Fulton Sheen:

"Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, I love you very much."

I beg you to spare the life of the unborn baby that I have spiritually adopted who is in danger of abortion."
